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Until a Child's Listening Cup Is Full

Miyakawa Takeo, Chief Director

In June, 2019 IICLO published a 271 page guide called *I Could Read by Myself; Book Guide of 200 Books for Young Children*. The total page is 271. The introduction I wrote begins with the fact that reading aloud activities at schools have been flourishing in Japan since around 2000, the Year of Children's Reading. "However, I am occasionally consulted by parents whose children enjoy being read to, but do not read by themselves, asking 'What should we do?'". I usually ask the child's age, and then the parent says that s/he has just entered primary school.... and I say, "Why don't you keep reading with your child until they are about nine years old?"





I have an image that children have a "listening cup" which fills up when stories are read aloud a lot. When the cup is full, I believe that the child can be an independent reader.

However, it is not easy to find enough books which are good for pouring into those listening cups. Therefore, we decided to publish this guide book with Hyoronsha. I and Doi Yasuko selected 200 titles supported by Hosoe Sachiyo, a freelance editor. This book is based on study meetings with school librarians and Doi in Osaka.

IICLO has been receiving many books and

materials on children's literature from publishers and individuals. We think that this is a good opportunity to introduce donated books to as many people as possible. We also published this book in light of the results of research projects which have given us insights into children's literature and reading.

This book is a new achievement for the IICLO. We focus on books for young children which are not very common in Japan, but cover a very important period when the roots of life are formed. We hope that you enjoy the book.

Lecture 1: Fantasy for Aman Kimiko

First, Ms. Aman read aloud her story, *Kitsune michi* wa Ten no Michi (Fox Street Is a Street in the Sky). Then Yasuko Doi of the IICLO interviewed Ms. Aman about the meaning of the phrase "Between Rainfalls", the importances of foxes for Ms. Aman, and the reason why she felt that the full moon night depicted in her book was situated on the sea bed.

Lecture 2: Fantasy for Tomiyasu Yoko

First, Ms. Tomiyasu introduced a tall story by her father, how to catch a lion, and then told us the full moon night when rice cakes were falling down from the sky in her childhood and an event of full moon for children when she became a mother. At the end of the lecture, she read aloud *Nanoko Sensei*, (A

Teacher Called Nanoko), which she wrote in her high school age.

Talk: The Way to Illustrate "Fantasy"

First, they told what they wondered about in their childhoods and why they wrote fantasy for children. Then they talked about their experiences of reading of Miyazawa Kenji, a Japanese fantasy writer. Ms. Aman said that *Gauche the Cellist* was her favorite and *Snow Crossing* was Ms. Tomiyasu's favorite story.

Since we have not properly discussed children's literature that targets the 5-8 year age group, we organized a three lecture series titled, Children's Literature for Young Children.

In the first lecture, Professor Miyake talked about how children's literature for young children started in English speaking countries. Then the works of Watanabe Shigeo and Matsuoka Kyoko both of whom are children's authors, translators and children's librarians were looked at in order to learn how we adopted children's literature for young children from English speaking countries and how to define this genre. Professor Miyake also engaged in discussions with the audience after the lecture.
