For the Future of Children and Book

Tomiyasu Yoko, Chief Director



I am honored to announce that I have been appointed to be the Chief director of the International Institute for Children's Literature, Osaka (IICLO).

Although I am a children's writer rather than a researcher, I have decided to accept the position due to the many long-standing connections I have had with the foundation.

However, after formally accepting this role, I found myself realizing just how little I truly knew about the foundation. I had not fully understood the circumstances under which the former Osaka prefectural International Institute for Children's Literature, once located in Expo '70 Commemorative Park in Senri, had been transformed into its present form and relocated to the Osaka Prefectural Central Library, nor had I grasped the full details of the foundation's current situation. Looking back now at its history, I am struck by the fact that fifteen years have already passed since it left Expo Park, and that the foundation has not only survived but continues its activities to this day—it almost feels miraculous.

This is undoubtedly thanks to the generous support and encouragement of so many people who understand the significance of the foundation's mission. I would like to express my heartfelt gratitude to all of you.

The Center for International Children's Literature at the Osaka Prefectural Central Library, which holds approximately 900,000 items of children's literature, continues to collect materials today with the cooperation of publishing

companies, with our foundation serving as the point of contact. These materials are preserved permanently at the Center, are made available for public access, and will continue to be used as resources for research, education, and outreach activities in the future.

As a writer, it is deeply reassuring and gratifying to know that even when a published book goes out of print, it can still be properly preserved and continue to exist without being lost.

In an age when books are consumed quickly and their life spans grow ever shorter, this offers one possible answer to the question of how we can protect the life of books. As long as The Center for International Children's Literature preserves and maintains these works, there may come a day in the future when forgotten books are brought back into the light. New researchers may connect new readers with books from the past.

The vast body of literature published from the Meiji and Taisho periods through to the present

day is, I believe, an irreplaceable asset not only for children, but for society as a whole. In order to ensure that the stories embodied in each book, along with the thoughts, knowledge, and information they contain, are not simply consumed and lost, I sincerely ask for your continued and increased support of the foundation.


An award ceremony was held at Lighty-hall at Osaka Prefectural Central Library on March 8th, 2025. A special lecture was given and is available for free on YouTube.
